



HORIZON — BEHIND THE SCENES TEACHER SUPPORT

LEARNING GOALS:

- Students will identify the purpose and intended audience of certain media texts.
- Students will consider which points of view are presented in media texts and how the texts might change if different perspectives were used.

GUIDING QUESTIONS:

- How balanced is the information represented in a given media text?
- 2. Are all points of view on an issue being represented?
- 3. What does perspective mean?
- 4. Does the source of media (news and opinions) affect your reaction to them?

CURRICULUM LINKS:

The HORIZON film and teacher support material provides an opportunity to address curriculum expectations in and Canadian Geography. Students will apply and share their ideas, personal perspectives and creative thoughts. In particular, students will have the opportunity to explore using the arts to share information, tell stories, preserve culture and encourage empathy by fostering understanding about different perspectives across Canada.

SUGGESTED ACTIVITY:

SCREEN THE FILM

HORIZON is SESQUI's marquee hemispherical film. This 20-minute film is soaring visual symphony that puts the viewer in the centre of the action during an inspiring showcase of Canadian creative expression that unfolds from coast to coast to coast. HORIZON takes us on an expedition from the highest peaks to the deepest seas, and through all ten provinces and three territories, as it reveals scenes that surprise and delight. Drawing upon artistic inspiration from our country's rich mosaic, the film features cultural traditions and contemporary creativity set in the unforgettable urban and natural landscapes of our diverse nation.

SCREENING CONSIDERATIONS

Ask students to think about the following questions as they watch the film:

- 1. Whose point of view is presented in the film? How does the viewer know this?
- 2. Whose point of view is missing?
- 3. Who is the intended audience of this film?
- 4. What purpose does this film serve for the intended audience?
- 5. What genre of filmmaking is being used (experimental, documentary, fiction) and why do you think it was chosen?

PERSPECTIVE ACTIVITY

Teachers can use this activity to introduce the concept of perspective into the classroom. Prepare students to act out a short story as the teacher reads it aloud. The short drama can be part of a well-known fable. The scene should only be a few minutes in length.

Before presenting, divide the classroom into "perspective" groups:

- Put blindfolds on one group.
- Have one group cover their ears.
- Have one group stand behind the action, so they can only see the performers' backs.
- Have one group stand outside for the first half of the skit.
- Have one group stand outside for the second half of the skit.

Present the story or scene while each group watches from its unique perspective, before discussing the following questions:

- 1. What perspective did each group have of the scene?
- 2. What makes individuals have different perspectives in their daily lives
- 3. Why do we celebrate different perspectives?
- 4. How can different perspectives sometimes cause tension and frustration between people?
- 5. How does one's environment influence his or her perspective?
